Kabir's Dohe कबीर के दोहे

Doha (Dohe plurel) is a two line poem. Kabir was a muslim poet but wrote in Hindi, a language understood by the common people. He wrote about simple stuff that people usually see around them. His style is also very simple. Little children in India are introduced to these two line poetry, which can be interpreted and understood by adults and children alike. Kabir's doha presents some teachings that is worth remembering and following in your everyday lives. These dohe are presented here in no particular order.

1. Dukh Mein Sumiran Sab Kare, Sukh Mein Kare Na Koi

Jo Sukh Mein Sumiran Kare, Dukh Kaahe Ko HOi

दुख में सुमरिन सब करे, सुख मे करे न कोय ।
जो सुख मे सुमरिन करे, दुख कहे को होय ॥ 1 ॥

Meaning:

When we are sad or in some difficulty, we (all of us) pray to God to help us overcome the pain or difficulty. No one prays when they are happy. For those who pray to God when they are happy, where is the suffering? Meaning there will be no suffering for those who pray to God when they are happy or sad.
